

**WINSTON CEMETERY
(Formerly Placer Cemetery)
BROADWATER COUNTY
WINSTON, MONTANA
OCTOBER 2006**

This cemetery is located on Cox Road, Township 9 North, Range 1 West, Section 25, northwest of Winston, Montana. Numerous graves are sunken and unmarked. Several graves are marked "Unknown US" and these are some of the re-interred graves from the Beaver Creek Cemetery which is now underwater from the Canyon Ferry Reservoir.

"WINSTON CEMETERY or Placer Cemetery. One grave is dated 1883, another, Robert Herd died in 1890, age 37 years, Murray MacMillan, a war veteran, died in 1991 and is marked with a metal monument. The present Winston Cemetery was first known as the Placer Cemetery. It was established by the Miner's Union. Here the miners or members of their families could be buried at the expense of the union. In the northeast corner are white markers on graves of these miners. In the northwest corner of the cemetery are the Beaver Creek graves, moved in 1950. Placer was established about 1880 and had a population of 14 people. It was a stopping place for travelers driving between Helena and Townsend. It had a hotel, store, post office and saloon. Placer was moved when the railroad was built and given the name Winston. Winston and the Winston area still use the cemetery as a burial ground." (page 179, Broadwater County Cemetery book, located in the Broadwater County Museum, Townsend, Montana)

"Winston is between Townsend and Helena. Among the early settlers there was the Beatty family, ancestors of Norma Beatty Ashby, who currently hosts "Today in Montana," a statewide television program. Winston began with Fred Goudy's Saloon, which was followed by the Duncan Hotel (sic-Dernen Hotel), a combined restaurant and rooming house. The Duncans (sic-Dernens) worked to promote the town after it was platted by the Northern Pacific Railroad, and farmers and ranchers settled the area. The Dodge brothers operated a rooming house in a rock building that still stands, though deserted and crumbling. Mines in the area were active 1908-18 and 1926-28, producing gold, silver, copper and lead. The biggest mine was the East Pacific, which was almost a town in itself, with shops, offices, two saloons, and a three-story bunkhouse for 150 workers. This place was sometimes referred to as Eagle City (Barbara Baum in *Broadwater Bygones*).

"The post office was established in 1892 with Warren Dodge as postmaster, but another record shows George Lamb in the position -- annual compensation, \$304.21. Winston was named during the railroad-building days for P.B. Winston, a contractor for the NP. Previously the area was known as Placer; the depot known by that name was loaded on a flatcar and moved to Winston. There was also a railroad siding and community near here called Beaver Creek and later, Placer.

“One of the first settlers around Winston was George Beatty*. He was a young New York man who was “doomed to die” -- presumably from tuberculosis -- who set out for Montana in the 1860's, hoping the mountain air would add a year or two to his life. He even brought his tombstone with him, and carved on it: *My mother's prayers kept me out of Hell. Thank God for a blessed hope beyond the grave.* Beatty stored the tombstone in a back shed and when he died -- at age ninety-two -- they put it on his grave in Helena, where it can be seen.” Roberta Carkeek Cheney, *Names on the Face of Montana, The Story of Montana's Place Names*, Mountain Press Publishing Company, Missoula, 1983.

*George Beatty is buried in Helena, Benton Avenue Cemetery, Helena, Montana. He has two tombstones, the tombstone that he brought with him, and another one with his second wife, Maggie.

1949, November 24, The Independent Record:

Canyon Ferry Cemetery Being Moved. Two public hearings regarding movement of graves from Beaver Creek and Canyon Ferry cemeteries, both within the reservoir area of the new dam, were conducted at Townsend and Helena recently by the bureau of reclamation. The nearest relatives of the dead have been, wherever possible, contacted and given a choice of locations to where the graves will be moved. The bureau is moving the graves to either Helena, Townsend or Winston cemeteries without charge. As the Canyon Ferry cemetery will not be inundated but will be on an island in the lake, relatives were given an option of leaving the grave at the present location but they were required to sign a waiver alleviating the government from any obligation of providing transportation from the shore to the grave. The Beaver Creek cemetery will be completely flooded and all of the graves will be moved to new sites. The unmarked graves, many of which are found at Canyon Ferry, will be moved to a plot in the old Placer cemetery near Winston. A section of the Winston cemetery, originally established as a resting place for dead miners, has been purchased from the county for that purpose. According to some of the early day residents of the area, many of the unmarked graves at Canyon Ferry were those of victims of the famed claimjumpers war in Cave gulch in the early days. However, many were marked with wooden slabs, but time has erased the marking or the boards have been carried away leaving the mound undesignated. The 50 odd graves at Canyon Ferry include many names which are synonymous with the pioneer area. Family names, often duplicated on the headstones, include Nolan, Harris, Dwyer, Gustafson, Elston, Byrd, Robertson, Clegg, Hoffer, Aastrup, Cassedy, Conable, Williams, Maloney, Angel and Dotson. Names on the grave markers at Beaver Creek, also including many pioneer residents, are Filson, Carpenter, Bruce, Reynolds, Karstrom, Rotz, Fisher, Davies, Herd, Thompson, Hammons, Grandolene, Donaldson, Falen, Hart, McLaughlin, True and Ridgeway.

One of the Dobler brothers shot at his ranch near Clasoil yesterday. News was received in Helena last night from Townsend that one of the Dobler brothers, living on a ranch about seven miles from East Helena, had been killed during the day by the accidental discharge of a shotgun. Clasoil is the nearest point to the accident, and as there is no telegraph operator there the news of the affair was very meager. From what could be learned at Townsend it appears that one of the brothers while going out the door accidentally discharged his gun, the trigger catching on the frame. His brother was behind him, and he received the full discharge, dying almost immediately. Deputy Sheriff Daniel McDonald, of Broadwater county, was in Helena last evening, and he was notified by telephone of the accident, and requested to meet the coroner of Broadwater county at East Helena. It appears that the body was to be brought to East Helena last night, and probably the inquest held there. Broadwater county men in town did not recall but one Dobler, Leopold, but from the advices from Townsend it appears there were two at the ranch

*Montana GenForum message dated April 28, 2000 from Merla Sears Van Norman: “I recently ran across an older newspaper article that included information about the first burial in a cemetery in Montana. It included the information about the grave of a young girl that died on a Wagon Train en route to Helena, Montana. There was a boulder used as a headstone and the name Alice Wimpey engraved in it with the year of 1867 below. Her birthdate could not be distinguished. She is buried in what is known as the Beaver Creek Cemetery over looking the Missouri River. It is believed that her parents only stayed in the area for a brief time and then moved on. No one was able to contact any relatives of this family in later years. They were possibly following the Gold Rush Trails. I hope this information will benefit someone researching this family”.
