"Townsend Blind Boy Admitted to Montana Bar"

Seldom does a person merit more credit than Clyde Troutman, who though blind since a small child, has fought his way until now he has obtained a goal scarce equaled by men who have their sight. He is but twenty-five years old and has passed the Montana State Bar examination having been one of four who successfully passed that examination at the state house in Helena last week out of a class of nine. This is the second try and this time met success.

Clyde Troutman lives with his father and sisters in Townsend and has been untiring in his efforts to do what he could for a livelihood as well as to improve himself in an educational way. He has been totally blind since three years of age and for years received training in Boulder in the school for the blind and, in addition, took a correspondence course in law which had not been completed when he left school. Through the aid of the state and kindness of friends who read to him, he was able to finish his course and reach the pinnacle of success and is now capable of practicing law in the state of Montana.

Since he has lived in Townsend he has made himself known in a musical way, being quite talented as a pianist and has often been employed to play at country dances and for a long time held the position as pianist in the Rex Theatre.

"Townsend Airport to Be Improved by County"

The Town Council met in a special session on Tuesday to consider the lease of the Townsend Municipal Airport which the Civil Aeronautics Authority has held for the past ten years. When the CAA took it over at that time, they had a well lighted field built with beacon

and course lights installed. The field has been kept cut and graded as any intermediate field is for an emergency landing field.

At this time several public spirited men believe that if they change the status of the field, government money can be obtained to build better runways and make the field more modern and put it in a state whereby it can be used more by commercial planes.

The council voted to turn the field over to the county to improve.

The county can, and is authorized by law, develop air facilities in the county. The plan adopted at the meeting was, the town would deed the land to the county on condition that it be used for air field purposes only, and if it ceased to be used as an airfield, it would revert back to the Town. Thus the way was paved for a co-operation between the county and the government to build a flying field here in place of the present emergency landing field. Post war flying is expected to be on a large scale and Broadwater County plans to be ready to benefit by any government program.

The two Townsend boys, each taking the first round, unfortunately drew the inside track for the second rounds and couldn't make the grade owing to the rougher surface, it was said.

Pierce was sponsored by Marshall-Wells of Townsend and Larry Kieckbusch was sponsored by the local American Legion post.

All boys competing in the Soap Box Derby received a free year's pass to all Bozeman theatres, a Browning ratchet screw driver from Coast-to-Coast stores and a free milk shake from Richardson's.

The entrants in Sunday's race, who will be under 16 years of age next summer, will be eligible to compete again in the amateur racing competition.
