### **“Storm Swoops in from North”**

The coldest storm experienced in many years swooped down over Montana today. At Townsend the mercury went down from 10 above at 11:00 o'clock Wednesday night and at 4:00 this afternoon stands at 20 degrees below with a high wind and blizzard raging from the north.

Judge Geo. W. Padbury and Court Stenographer Jack Faftery motored out from Helena, but were forced to take the train back to Helena. So intense was the blizzard, that the few cars on the road were driving with the lights on. B.F. Sautter played good Samaritan and assisted many of the school children who were unprepared for the severity of the storm.

Principal H.C. Good reported one child froze its face quite severely.

Reports are that the worst blizzard in years is blowing over the Dakotas and today the storm is felt in almost every state in the union. A 37-year-old record of cold is broken in Minnesota and trains are delayed, some schools closed and much distress generally is felt through the middle empire states.
