### **“Plans Under Way to Buy Flooded Properties Here”**

A representative of the Billings Office of the Bureau of Reclamation was in Townsend one day last week conferring with Ed Heuer, member of the Broadwater County Board of Commissioners, about several pieces of property subject to flooding damage during the ice jams.

Included in the list is the county rest home. Mr. Heuer took the representative to the home, and also showed him the location of the other properties. He told Mr. Heuer that the Billings Office got orders from Washington to buy the rest home, Green’s processing plant, the Goodwin property (which includes the River Inn Motel and possibly the River Inn) and the Wine property across the river.

The Bureau man indicated he would be back the first of February with a crew to appraise the properties.

### **Three Trustees Reappointed to H.S. Board”**

All three high school trustees whose terms expired in December were reappointed by the Board of County Commissioners last month. They are Bill Berberet and Kathryn Hunsaker of Toston and Lyman Etwiler of Townsend. Other members of the board are Keith Valentine of Townsend; James Cox of Winston; Douglas Christie of the Johnson Community in the lower valley and Mrs. Ruth G. Carson, County Superintendent of Schools who is ex-officio member.

The board has reorganized by electing James Cox as chairman, Bill Berberet as vice chairman and Mrs. Carson secretary.
