“Narrowly Escapes When Car Rolls off Highway”

Mrs. Evan Kimpton, Crow Creek Valley, narrowly escaped a serious mishap on Saturday night when her car went over the embankment on the road between Three Forks and Logan. She, in company with Mrs. W.A. Sherlock and her father, C.F. Matsler, were enroute to Logan where Mr. Matsler was taking the train for Glendive. The roads were slick as glass and in attempting to pass one of those road hogs, Mrs. Kimpton’s car started to slide and it was impossible to hold it on the road. But she was driving very slowly and the car nosed over the embankment and settled nearly on its side, but did not tip over. All three occupants had some difficulty in getting out of the car, but no one was injured and the car was not damaged.

An obliging motorist came along and took Mr. Mastler to his train and the wrecker from the Avery Garage in Three Forks was called and in a short time, the car was pulled back into the road and the driver continued on her way very slowly and very thankful no serious damage had been done.

“Twenty-two Make H.S. Honor Roll”

Twenty-two students have earned enough honor points during the first six weeks of the school period to receive places on the school honor roll. "Broadwater Has 87% Turnout"

"Division Champions"

Coach Casey Keltz and his Broadwater County High School Bulldogs rolled into another championship Saturday when the Townsend football team won over Superior 28 to 7 for the Western Division Class C crown. Superior was the champion of the far western district. It was a hard fought game all the way, with Townsend coming up with 10 first downs to Superior's 9, but the Bulldogs made their gains count.

Superior scored first, early in the first quarter on a long pass play. Keltz had been warned of their passing attack and coached the Bulldogs on pass defense. As a result the Bobcats completed but 7 of 21 pass attempts for a total gain of 105 yards. Townsend interrupted three Superior passes – two by Bob Thompson and one by Harry Buckingham, all costly for the Bobcats.

Townsend came back in the first quarter to tie it up 7 – 7, and late in the second quarter Halfback Cecil Hunsaker broke away for a 50 yard TD run which gave the Bulldogs a 14 – 7 lead at the half.

Townsend's line, led by big Dan Wooley and Mike Hargrove, co-captains, held Superior's ground game to 55 yards while the Bulldogs netted 181 yards rushing. Jerry Waling was superb in his quarterback job, and the entire team played the best game of the season.

They got off to a bad start by losing the ball to Superior on a fumble which set up the visitors for their first and only score.

In the ten games this year our Bulldogs held their opponents to 58 points while running up 268 points, quite an impressive record for the Keltzmen.

Fifteen seniors on the squad wound up their high school football playing in a blaze of glory, and another senior, Mark Whitehead, who was ill and unable to play, contributed much to the wins in the first eight games of the season as quarterback, alternating with Waling and Dale Sprout. Seniors besides Whitehead are: Waling, Tracy Plummer, Buckingham, Mike Ragen, Bert Tarrant, Chuck Smith, Don Truscott, Dick Nash, Bob Thompson, Hunsaker, Larry Gilstrap, Dan Neifert, Lloyd Deadmond, Dan Wooley and Mike Hargrove.
