1899

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received up to 2 p.m. on Monday, June 12, 1899 for the construction of a new school house, according to the specifications to be found in the office of the clerk and recorder of Broadwater County.

Successful bidder will be required to give a bond in the sum of \$1,500 for the completion of said building within 100 days from the day of signed contract.

Memorial Day was observed by the people of Radersburg. Mrs. Tower, with her pupils, drove down to the graveyard with many wreaths of flowers, they were followed by a number of the town people. The school children sang appropriate songs both going and coming from the cemetery.

The auditorium was formally opened and dedicated last night. Early in the evening the sidewalk from Broadway east, put on a metropolitan air, as couple after couple bent on seeing all that was to be seen passed into this immense building which measures 48x100 feet with gallery that will comfortably hold 100 chairs. A beautiful chandelier from which 17 electric jets radiated their soft illumination hung suspended from the center of the ceiling besides numerous other lights in different parts of the room.
