

The Tree Board reminds everyone that trees need water now! Teri Blahnik, the water nymph with the blue thumb, has been hired again to water over 750 of our new trees in town planted since 2005. Teri started watering two weeks ago! Please follow her



Please water trees to the drip line with at least a minimum of 1 inch of water. This can be checked by setting out a used tuna or pet food can. When the can is full the tree will have received at least some survival moisture. And if possible, soak the entire soil profile. The trees thank you!

The Tree Board is preparing for spring planting season. They will use all their donated 5-6' steel fence posts by May 1. If anyone has any old used 5 -6' steel fence posts they would like to donate, please call Patrick Plantenberg 431-4615. The Tree Board will need at least a couple of hundred posts this season.

Trailhead Christian Fellowship Church Expansion Progress

Trailhead Christian Fellowship Church is planning a major building expansion at its church off Hwy 287 north of Townsend, reflecting the growth of both its own congregation and that of Broadwater County.

The "Building to Serve" fundraising campaign will allow the church to begin construction this spring or early summer. The plan calls for a 7,200 square foot addition to include eight classrooms, a gym, large kitchen, and reception facilities at an estimated cost of up to \$2million when it is completed.

Church trustees and membership began plans last year for the expansion. Currently the church is serving upwards of 80 families a week and 70 junior and senior high schoolers at Wednesday night youth group. With church member sponsorship, the Broadwater County community uses the building for funerals, weddings, 4-H Club meetings, and as a Red Cross emergency shelter.

The church began with five couples in a private home in January 2001. By June 2003, 30 people were meeting at the Rod and Gun Club on Canton Lane. The congregation had grown to 75 members by 2004. Construction of the new building began that year. Two Greyhound busloads of Mennonites of Weaverland Church in Lancaster, Pennsylvania helped Trailhead volunteers construct the current building. The Mennonite group had built new fencing after the 2000 Toston-Maudlow fire here in Broadwater County. By August of 2007 the congregation celebrated the new building near the lake at 20 Trailhead View Dr. with its first service and dedication.


The expansion committee began fundraising last fall with a Fall Fest booth plus two large events at Christmas which included a wreath booth at the Christmas Stroll and a community concert. Organizers are hoping to bring back those community events annually. Many folks in the community as well as church members have contributed a total of \$612,000.

"If we can gather a total of \$650,000 we can set up a mortgage to begin construction this spring and summer," according to expansion chairman Chase Ragen, "We are very excited to be only \$38,000 away from breaking ground."

He pointed out that \$1million total would help the church pour the slab, put up the walls and install the roof. The interior can be finished in sections with the help of volunteers from the community and the church.

Expansion Update

Townsend, MT - Billings Clinic Broadwater is excited to announce the opening of its new clinic and rehabilitation space and is nearing completion of its expanded Emergency Room. Last summer, the hospital also remodeled four inpatient rooms to help improve the healing environment and patient experience.

The new clinic space provides nine exam rooms to allow for additional providers and outreach services. The rehabilitation department is now located above the clinic and now has over 2,000 sq ft of space to service the physical, occupational and speech therapy needs of patients in Broadwater County. The clinic and rehabilitation areas are both accessible from the new front entrance at the corner of Oak and 2nd Streets.

The expanded Emergency Room which is slated to open in the next month includes 3 new private ER bays, as well as a new ER entrance, reception and waiting area. This expansion will bring Broadwater's total ER capacity to 5 beds, providing greater capacity for patients to be seen here in Townsend instead of traveling elsewhere for 24/7 emergency care.

Billings Clinic Broadwater continues to serve the community providing primary care, diagnostic imaging services including 64 slice CT, laboratory, acute skilled nursing, and transitional care. Billings Clinic Broadwater also provides specialty care with cardiology, OB/GYN, Pediatrics, Podiatry through onsite outreach, and psychiatry services via telehealth.

The Broadwater team will be hosting a barbeque and open house on May 4^{th} from 11:00 AM - 2:00 PM and invites you to come and take a tour of the new expansion as the finishing touches are being completed.




Valentine's Day Dinner Fund Raiser

Skatepark Update

The dates have been set and the design is done! The skatepark is set to begin construction May 22 and should be completed by June 18th. The design looks GREAT and everyone who has seen it agrees. Looks like FUN! The MoU has been signed between the City of Townsend and Evergreen Skateparks, the signage that we need has been approved, but the maintenance MoU between the city and STOKE still needs to be written and executed. STOKE will be initiating a "Name Your Skatepark" contest soon with the winner being announced sometime during the construction time. The winner will also win a super nice skateboard donated by the Montana Skatepark Assoc. in Missoula. There are two skateboards which are being displayed at the school, the winner will take their pick of the two. We will be planning a big celebration after the skatepark is completed in Holloway Park. Jeff Ament (Pearl Jam), one of the main contributors to the funds for the construction will be there to celebrate with us. Jeff usually brings skateboards and equipment to hand out, free of charge, to the kids who need them. Jeff has been very generous to all the kids in Montana. Other monetary contributors are the MT Skatepark Assoc. the Broadwater Co. Trust Bd., and Carla Amundson's original skateboarding group.



Game Night

Game Night continues to be popular. We have recently ordered another Ping Pong table on wheels as this seems to be the most popular among the kids (and adults who come). Many other games are available including

foosball, corn hole boards, chess, pool and others. We are also planning on starting movie night again with a night planned in April.

Snapology of Helena

Snapology, a STEAM oriented educational program, has been a very successful project for us and the kids. Grades 3-5 seem to have been the most enthusiast about the classes and we will be finishing up our third round of sessions for this school year this spring. If students were to sign for the class on their own, it would cost \$96/student to participate but STOKE has sponsored all three classes, the first two classes with funds from the school and the last class through our own funds. Snacks are provided also for these kids.

The Sewing Sisters Club

The girls and Laura Frasier, instructor and mentor, are going strong. I believe the girls have been learning hand embroidery while still progressing on their other projects such as shopping bags and clothes for themselves. The girls have also been helping when they can with our fundraisers. A great bunch of kids.

Fly Fishing 101

We just finished up our Fly Fishing 101 clinic. Six students from the sixth grade participated in the three sessions. STOKE set up and sponsored all the sessions. The sessions were held in town, not at the river, but the kids are ready now to try their luck at the real thing, already wondering how they are going to cook their fish. We think a cooking class is now in order. A great start to our Outdoor Program!

Pottery and Ceramics

Teddy Lewis has started the Pottery and Ceramics class utilizing the Art room in the high school. Right now he has two very talented sculptors producing some amazing pieces of art. Teddy said they might even be better than him on some pieces. The Art room will be shut down for the summer as some water damage work is being done so he is looking for an alternate spot. He is exploring some options. One is a possible spot at the new Reading Leaves location (old Bert's Hardware). Rachael has expressed interest in giving some space to the potters, especially to sell or display their art work. Thank you Rachael! Also, there is a good possibility of an adult class starting as there has been a lot of interest from many people. Teddy has high hopes of starting a Potters Guild here in Townsend and he has the support of the Clay Arts Guild of Helena and the Archie Bray.

OPI-ESSER After School Grant

STOKE has been successful in a receiving a grant from the State of Montana's OPI (Office of Public Instruction) for some of its ESSER (Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief) funds. We were awarded \$53,190 for after school projects and equipment but we have yet to receive the funds. Also, we were informed at the last minute that we can only use the funds during the school year and not for any summer programs which we had hoped we could fund. The year these funds can be expended in is January 2022 – December 2022 so some can be spent retroactively. We have budgeted for some pottery equipment so we will be able to purchase that and have budgeted money for other after school projects such as Snapology, the sewing club and others. We had also budgeted money for an extensive Outdoor program which was to be conducted in most of the summer months. We will have to re-think that program, schedule and funds.

STOKE's Empty Bowl Fundraiser - April 22, Earth Day

We are preparing for our next fundraiser, the Empty Bowl event, where all the proceeds go to the Food Pantry. This event will be held in the 4-H building at the Fairgrounds, from 4:00 pm to 8:00 pm, Friday, April 22nd. The Clay Arts Guild of Helena artisans have been throwing bowls for this project for a while and have promised at least 300 bowls. Quite a few are already done for the event. Teddy Lewis, our board member who initiated this fundraiser, says there are some really nice bowls, some of various sizes. Others are also making bowls for this event. We could end up with close to 400 when it's all said and done. How this event works; the initial ticket is \$15 which allows you to choose a pottery bowl and then you will get free chili and/or potato soup and bun for your bowl. Since this is on Earth Day, all of our food bowls, cups and utensils will be compostable and/or biodegradable. We will have disposable bowls for your food so you don't have to get your nice pottery bowl dirty. Bob Tootell is making the chili and potato soup. I've heard he is a darn good cook, award winning some have said. The buns are being donated by Wheat Montana.

There will be activities there also. The local high school Jazz Band will be playing off and on. We will have a couple of ping pong tables set up and some other games. There will be two potter's wheels and an exhibition by professional potters, a hand building table and some hands-on practical experience for a limited number of people throughout the event. Some artists from Helena will also be present. We are hoping to have more activities by the time the event comes around. This will definitely be a FUN evening for the whole family! March Kindness in Heritage Park

What a great community we live in! The playground at Heritage Park just received two loads of new wood chips from RY Timber. Many thanks to local resident Richard Tramp for seeing the need to freshen the wood chips around the playground equipment and making all the arrangements.

Richard volunteered at Rotary's Fall Fest last year and saw the need to do something. Richard contacted the city and was referred to Rotarian and Tree Board Chair Patrick Plantenberg who has coordinated the delivery and placement of past wood chip orders for the playground. Richard contacted RY Timber and Dan Richards agreed to deliver two 14-cubic yard woodchip loads free of charge to the playground!

Patrick used his landscaping business tractors to spread the wood chips. Patrick's wife Mary and a family picnicking in the park from Gallatin Gateway and their grandchildren from White Sulphur Springs helped final rake the chips into place.

RY Timber is a Fall Fest Sponsor and for helping with the playground, Rotary has offered RY Timber a \$500 in-kind sponsorship for the 2022 Fall Fest September 30-October 2. This was all done for the kids! Thanks to all for making this happen.

Montana Remote Work Certification course teaches workers the skills they need to transition to remote work.

Things are changing due to more people working from home during COVID. "The prospect of working from home is intriguing to me" said a course participant who lives in a Montana rural community. "Working remotely, would save me nearly an hour of driving each day and would give me more time with my family."

Participants have taken the month-long course, which consists of nine core modules delivered in a self-paced, online format along with four discussion -based virtual workshops. In addition to on-line tools common to remote work, participants learn soft skills crucial to working with a remote team such as written communication, problem solving, time management, collaboration, goal setting, organization, and accountability.

"I've been taking some time to figure out how I can use my skills to transition to remote work since the retail store I managed was closed last year," said another participant. "I wanted to stay in my community and not spend an hour or more driving each way to a job out of town. This course is exactly what I needed to know to jump into a remote position since I haven't worked remotely before."

Participants have got some great things out of the course. In general, the course filled in the missing information about what it is like to work remotely which gives participants a clear path to finding a remote job so they can stay in town and not move or travel for work. The group project was particularly helpful for participants because it allowed them to experience what it is like to get to know people via Zoom and to work on a project together.

MSU Extension faculty will serve as coaches for Montana participants through the course. Once they complete the course, Job Service of Montana will help graduates find a remote job. Graduates interested in creating or expanding a remote business will have access to Accelerate Montana's Rural Innovation Initiative at the University of Montana to help them take their business to the next level.

THE REMOTE WORK REVOLUTION

HAVE YOU HEARD OF "REMOTE WORK?" With a growth rate of 140% since 2005, remote work is changing the way people work all around the world. The Rural Online Initiative was designed to help people in rural communities and employers capitalize on the rise of remote work. By learning how to work remotely, people can find better paying jobs or jobs that better fit their skills without having to move away from their community. For employers, learning how to manage remote workers can increase access to the talented employees needed to grow a business.

WHAT IS REMOTE WORK? Remote work is any form of work that does not require the worker to regularly commute to a centralized location to perform a job. Typically, this means the individual fits into one of these categories: FREELANCER A self-employed individual who works as an independent contractor for short-term clients. ENTREPRENEUR A self-employed individual who organizes and operates a business or businesses.

VIRTUAL EMPLOYEE An employed individual who works at an independent location instead of commuting to a centralized office or shop. Without the commute time or dress code, it's understandable why this work model is gaining so much popularity. But, it's important to note that the benefits of distributed workforces far surpass the appeal of wearing sweatpants to work. Around the world, individuals, businesses, and governments are learning to use the strategy of remote work to design better lives.

With a growth rate of 140% since 2005, remote work is changing the way people work all around the world. The Rural Online Initiative was designed to help people in rural communities and employers capitalize on the rise of remote work. By learning how to work remotely, people can find better paying jobs or jobs that better fit their skills without having to move away from their community. Part of the ROI program includes evaluating compatibility to current work experience or business operations.

BCDC - Affordable Housing and Homeless Forum

Housing and Homeless forum/meeting March 16th at the Lodge. The entire meeting was committed to the discussion of the issue concerning the lack of housing, particularly the lack of affordable housing, and the apparent developing homeless situation in Broadwater County.

Also present were: Susie Hedalen -Townsend School District Superintendent, Brian Obert also represented MBAC, JB Howick -Townsend Hardware, John Larsen, Roland Heaton - Food Pantry, Teddy Lewis - Silver Sage Counseling, Wynn Meehan - Sheriff, Jeff Garrard and Jeanie Steele (phone) -Jeanie Steele Realty, Nichole Brown also representing the County Planning office, Tony Woodward and wife - ag and loan officer - Opportunity Bank, Jenny Clowes - CEO Billings Clinic Broadwater, Mike Evans - Mayor, Debi Randolph - County Commissioner, Paul Kroeger - Construction, Kathryn McBee - author of a book on the Home-

As these issues are extremely important to the success of our community and the welfare of our workforce, more research and discussion needs to continue.

Here are a few highlights from the forum;

Superintendent Susie Hedalen - There are several homeless families in the Townsend area in various forms of homelessness and needs but none are sleeping on the streets. Some are receiving some assistance to alleviate some immediate needs. The school is receiving an average of seven new students per week, mostly in the elementary grades. Some high school students are choosing to leave school for work rather than continuing onto graduation. Students have limited access to mental health as hiring has been challenging. Affordable housing is needed to alleviate many of these issues.

Roland Heaton, Food Pantry - The Food Pantry is solvent and well stocked with food for now. They have been reaching out to help people whenever they can or know of someone with food needs. The Food Pantry is open weekly on a limited basis but can be available anytime for special needs. They have even helped with short term housing on a very limited scale.

Teddy Lewis, Silver Sage Counseling – Townsend needs a social worker(s). We could possibly start a club for food and work, possibly a homeless shelter.

Jenny Clowes, CEO Billings Clinic Broadwater - 16% of their employees live in Helena as they cannot find affordable housing here. Two thirds (2/3) of their part time employees live out of town. Renting option, if you can find it, is \$1550/month plus utilities. They are in need of more staffing but applicants can't find housing so the applicants, if they do get them, turn elsewhere. Again the need for affordable housing.

Tony Woodward, Loan officer at Opportunity Bank - We need to keep people in town. They have been looking at HUD housing. An average of two people per day come to them who live in Helena but want to live here. Again, the need for affordable housing.

Broadwater County Development Corp. (BCDC) hosted an Affordable Nichole Brown, County Planning - Broadwater County experienced 600% growth (over the year before, not total increase) in 2020 but only 37% last year. Most of the growth was at the southern end of the county.

Brian Obert, MBAC - Possible solutions for housing could be a CTE program where some Montana high schools are building tiny houses. Cabins, Many community leaders and concerned citizens attended, giving their cooperative housing are thoughts. With the copper mine coming on, we could see even more need for housing for those employees. The employee rate here is very low. Also child care issues have been and will be an issue. Programs like AJAY (American Jobs for American Youth) are helping to build a better, younger workforce.

> Paul Kroeger, local builder, Trailhead Church - The Trailhead Church has opened its door to help with needy as they have shower facilities and other short term amenities. White Sulphur Springs had used bonds to gain access to housing investment money.

> Jeanie Steele, Jeanie Steele Realty - The median price of a home in Broadwater County is now \$404,000, \$350,000 just for a fixer upper. Average price of a lot in Townsend is \$124,380 but will be re-accessed in 2023. Just to get into a rental costs \$7000. Jeanie has a lot more data but I will share that at a later time.

> Wynn Meehan, BC Sheriff - The people that are able to move to Townsend have annual incomes of \$70,000 or more. It used to be he was almost alone on the steps of the courthouse when selling houses at a sheriff's sale. Now, there are ten people wanting to buy. He sold one house for \$120,000 that should have been torn down. The drug problem is getting worse. More drugs are coming and are cheaper. His office is making 2-3 arrests/week on meth possessions alone.

> Mike Evans, Mayor - There is a new subdivision on the south end of Townsend, Copper Springs. There are plans for some apartment buildings

> Kathryn McBee, local citizen - Kathryn has been involved with the homeless situation for much time, volunteering aid to them when she can. She has even written a book on the subject. She warns, be aware, there is sex trafficking in Montana and it is active. She is also interested in helping with the homeless pets as they need assistance also.

> These are just a few of the comments that I gathered from the limited notes that I took. I hope that I captured the essence of the meeting and the one priority that was agreed on at that meeting was the immediate need for workforce housing, affordable workforce housing. As to how that is accomplished is still under discussion. Be assured, we are not alone in this problem but there are solutions being tried in many places.

> If I misquoted anyone or missed someone, I am sorry as I am not the best note taker.
