Sharp Shinned Skatepark

The New Skatepark in Holloway Park in Townsend

I'm sure many of you have witnessed the construction and completion of the new skatepark in Townsend. I have reported on the progress of it many times and it is now a reality. 4500 square feet of beautifully sculpted concrete laid down by the artisans of the Evergreen Skateparks construction company. Unfortunately, I didn't get a group picture of the crew but Catherine sent me the roster. First foreman on the job - Ben Hlavacek, second foremen - Lance Spiker and Jordan Williams, the rest of the crew - Nicky Gaynor, Stephen Krochta, Brian Sizer, Tim Miller, Billy Coulon, Ryan Majors, Jack Muzzey. Billy is the owner and skatepark designer aficionado. Catherine Coulon, Billy's wife, is the take care of everything from the office gal and boy is she good at it. All were great to work with and did their job with integrity and a smile. They love what they do and it showed. They were also the first ones to try it out, making sure it skates great as shown in the drone picture below.



As soon as the last of the skatepark crew left (headed to Deer Lodge to build a 10,000 sqft skatepark) and the legal signage was up, there were kids and others maneuvering through the bowls, over the jumps and traversing the humps, all with skateboards, scooters, bikes, roller skates and other contraptions I don't know the name for but just having a great time. All the feedback I've heard is that it's super fun.

There is still some to do, replacing the irrigation system, laying sod, and installing a permanent skatepark sign but the majority of work is done.

The Parks and Rec board has received approval from the City Council to There is a genuine need for grant writers in Broadwater County. Several build a 24' x 27' pavilion in the Northwest corner of Holloway Park, just north of the skatepark. They have also been approved for funding from the Broadwater County Trust Board (BCTB) and will begin construction on it sometime this summer or fall. Picnic tables are also included in the budget for the pavilion. These are three nice additions for the park, including the vaulted toilet which was also funded by the Parks and Rec and BCTB.

STOKE is planning on a big celebration to officially open the skatepark on August 13th. We are waiting till August as Jeff Ament, who contributed \$50,000 to the skatepark, is on a European tour with his band "Pearl Jam" till the end of July. Jeff is anxious to come and share our celebration of the opening. Other officials will be here I'm sure such as Chris Bacon with the Montana Skatepark Association, another \$50,000 contributor. Carla Amundson will be donating funds to the skatepark as she and her group of kids started working on this over 20 years ago. She has kept these funds all these years in anticipation of this event. She is one happy camper.

Other people and organizations who have helped or supported this project - STOKE, the main promoter of this skatepark; The City Council and Mayor Mike Evans who have worked with STOKE to approve this in their park; the Broadwater County Trust Board and the county commissioners for their support and \$60,000 worth of funding; the residents for their patience during construction; Tim Rauser, City Foreman, and crew Lee Lewis, Eric Crush, and Paul Rauser who have been extremely helpful all the way through the process; Watson Irrigation, donated drainage pipe: Al Bodle, geotextile fabric for use in the drainage system; Rick Anderson, Lone Mountain Transport, for supplying an enormous amount of lime rock gravel; Hahn Ranch, donating extra topsoil and installing the drainage area; Capital Concrete for supplying the shock-crete and providing a 15% discount for the project; Aaron Christensen and Tri Rivers Construction for donating scrap lumber for concrete forms; George Jenkins for attempting a skatepark sign; Clint Watson who wanted to help with our sign but ran out of time at the school; Montana Hydraulics who will be making the laser cut sign; Pat Plantenberg and his crew, moving small trees in the way of the skatepark and helping with landscaping; Sodworks who will be providing sod; Adam Six and the Parks and Rec board for advice and amenities; many excited and anxious kids who helped along the way such as Will Lynde and Bastien Grandy; Bridger Nunn for coming up with the winning name for the skatepark and all the kids who participated in the name contest. I hope I didn't leave out anyone and I'm sure there will be many more before we are all said and done. A special thanks to all the kids and young adults who have been patiently waiting until this project came to fruition. This Skatepark is for you!

years ago, BCDC sponsored aspiring grant writers to attend such schools. We are now arranging a couple of workshops scheduled for this fall and already have approximately twenty interested people to attend these workshops. STOKE's After School Art-Pottery Program

The summer program has completed 2 of the 3 groups of students participating in the summer school pottery program with forty students completing 12 hours of education focused on hands on clay building. (Ball clay, Coil clay), and basic understanding of clay and sculpture. The break out group invites students to build a sculpture, without verbal or non-verbal communication while being aware of their thoughts and feelings throughout the session. Finally the students are encouraged to express their thoughts and feelings with the group. This process helps students to enhance mindfulness, and emotional awareness in a safe environment to share verbally the experience. This is an example of becoming self and socially aware, build healthy relationship skills, and self-management-(emotional regulation/awareness/expression). The Art Process is a clear example of self-expression and each artist is given the opportunity to define their expression/creative work. During this process we have used 350#s of clay. One high-school student has volunteered from our after school program to teach basic techniques learned in the STOKE After School program. This is evidence of selfactualization, building relationships and healthy community involvement. Using one kiln, I have loaded and bisque fired two batches. I will end up firing another three or four batches. By the eleventh of July, all pottery will be bisque fired and artists from all three groups will glaze their artwork. All of the artists will be given a cup to glaze as some of the artwork will not make it through the whole firing process. This will give the artists an opportunity to work with the glazes on the eleventh and practice their skills learned in the program.



We have investigated at least three locations for a Studio for the ceramics but none have worked out. The cost to buy is over our budget for now. Teddy has ordered equipment for the program from Archie Bray that could take months to arrive due to shipping issues. We have a space for the equipment when it arrives but we do not have a space for the program. The temporary location is at 122 N. Walnut. (Red Schoolhouse owned by Teddy and Theresa Lewis.) We may move some of the program back t the school art room when school resumes in the fall. We will see how the temporary location works out.

Backpacks for the Homeless 2022

This year's Point in Time Survey, conducted in late January, indicates there are 143 unsheltered neighbors currently residing in Helena. We see them daily and many of us ask, "What can we do?" At the United Way of Lewis & Clark Area we are devoting a significant amount of our time into collaborating, so we can answer this critical question. There are many complicated, upstream factors contributing to this local challenge. Issues like the affordable housing crisis, shortage of mental health and addiction counselors, and an economy that favors those with means and people who are housed. These are not small matters, but at the United Way, we are convening community leaders to address these matters because we believe the answers to Helena's challenges lie right here, within our community. In Montana we take care of our neighbors!

One effort we are sponsoring this summer on behalf of our unsheltered neighbors, is a donation ask from the community... "Backpacks for the Homeless". People can donate backpacks, funds, or specific items to fill the backpacks. We will accept donations through the end of August in hopes of distributing backpacks in the fall through our nonprofit partners. 
* Editor's Note:

Big Sky, Big Leadership, Broadwater County

A second session of Big Sky, Big Leadership in Broadwater County has been announced! This is a statewide community leadership initiative developed by MSU Extension and offered at the county level. It seeks to address the need for leaders in rural communities and help participants develop skills, increase un- STATE UNIVERSITY derstanding of local community dynamics and improve awareness of local issues.



EXTENSION

Through the program, participants will:

LEARN - Broaden understanding of issues and opportunity in Broadwater County.

ENGAGE - Experience our community through fun, interactive

DEVELOP - Challenge yourself as an individual to enhance your leadership skills.

CONNECT – Establish relationships with a diverse group of people.

ACT – Develop a personal commitment to become involved in the community.

The program consists of monthly daylong sessions from September to May. Each session includes leadership skill development and a community experience. Leadership topics include communication, conflict management, personality styles, group formation, generational differences, leadership styles and effective meetings. The purpose of the community experience is to increase awareness and understanding of local community resources and issues. Each session features an on-site visit, guest speaker or panel to present critical information on a topic. Proposed experiences

include tourism, natural resources, agriculture, manufacturing, local government, education and mining. Another unique feature of this program is, over the course of the program, the group meets throughout the county including Wheatland, Toston, Radersburg and Winston.

Townsend's Farmers' Market

Did You Know:

Townsend's Farmers' Market has been operating for twelve years and Chris and Don Hettinger have been there for every one of their weekly sessions in those TWELVE years. They would like a less hectic schedule and are asking for some help or even part time help to do some of the coordination and oversight work. If you have an interest in this, please talk with them. You will find them at the market 3:00 to 6:00 PM on Thursday just north of the Copy Cup. Chris and Don would love to visit with you, in between customers.

Did You Know:

There is still room for several more vendors and it only costs \$5/day, a real bargain compared to many of the other markets, to park and sell your wares. Just make sure you contact Chris ahead of time so she can make sure what you are selling is allowable. Don't worry, Chris is a sweetheart but you still have to abide by the procedures.

Did You Know:

If you grow it, make it or bake it here in Broadwater County, you can sell it at the Farmers' Market, a few restrictions apply. (You could probably guess what!) It's not just garden produce but bread, cookies, pies, baked goods, jams and jellies, soap, eggs, milk, clothing, even fancy, great eating mushrooms. Who would have thunk it?? The fresh produce items such as greens, onions, strawberries etc are now coming in. Each week more will show up as the gardens mature.

Did You Know:

The market is handicap accessible! If you are in your car, you don't even have to get out. Just drive close and the vendors will come take your order, prepare it, and bring it back to you, all from the comforts of your vehicle. Do you know of other farmers' markets where you can do that?

So, take a couple minutes out of your busy day to buy some delicious home grown food and other wares. Or if you feel the urge to visit all the friends you haven't seen for a while, COME ON DOWN. 3:00 – 6:00 pm from now until the 29th of September, every Thursday, north of the Copy Cup on Front Street right here in Townsend.







Domestic violence and sexual assault are crimes that impact a significant number of people in the tri-county area. One in four and one in seven men have been victims of severe physical violence by an intimate partner in their lifetime, and nearly one in five women and one in 71 men in the U.S. have been raped at some time in their lives. Our community is not immune, but these victims don't have to navigate their experience on their own.

The mission of The Friendship Center is to be a safe haven for those affected by domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking and to empower our community to flourish in relationships free from violence. The Friendship Center is the only organization in the tri-county area serving those affected by these crimes through shelter, education, and advocacy.

The Friendship Center has served our community for 50 years. Showing up in the middle of the night to the hospital. Accompanying survivors of abuse and assault to court hearings. Listening to the heartbreaking stories that bring each person to our doorstep. We provide 24/7 crisis counseling, safe shelter, law enforcement and hospital responses, legal advocacy, safety planning, and other resources like transportation.

The Friendship Center provides all of our services free of charge. Financial abuse and/or poverty is a significant factor for nearly all of the clients we serve. Survivors often struggle to access housing as they seek to escape abusive situations. When survivors seek refuge at our shelter, they are empowered to put the pieces of their lives back together. By supporting them in meeting their most basic needs, residents can turn their sights on long-term goals and focus their energy on saving for a future free from violence.

It's remarkable what people can accomplish when they are given a sense of safety. For example, Sarah* moved into our shelter after fleeing an abusive relationship in a nearby town, looking for a safe place to get back on her feet. Once moved in, Sarah connected with numerous community resources including: healthcare for her and her son; a therapist; civil legal services; childcare; professional training; and funding to continue her education. Sarah also began college. After her first day of classes, she told a staff member, "I forgot who I was for a long time. Now, I am starting to remember." She said she felt proud of herself and believes she is working hard and finally moving forward.

The Friendship Center's shelter includes five rooms for emergency housing, in which victims can stay for up to 90 days. We also have eight rooms in our Healthy Transitions program that provides longer term housing to residents until they are able to find stable, long-term housing on their own. Some choose to save for future housing as well as to get a financial foothold, pay off debt, address medical and dental issues, and pursue educational opportunities. While safe shelter remains a core service, we serve many more clients through our non-residential programs, as outlined in the services mentioned above.

Although statistics cannot tell the whole story, in 2021, TFC received 1,390

calls to our crisis line from 598 known individuals who were seeking help related to domestic violence, sexual assault or stalking, and we provided 1,150 hours of crisis intervention, crisis line counseling or in-person crisis counseling provided to 615 known individuals. In all, we provided 6,934 total services to 635 known individuals in 2021 including 1,093 incidences of legal advocacy, 666 safety planning services, and 5,731 nights of safe shelter to a total of 130 adults and 27 children.

While our shelter is for women and their children, we also help men who are victims of domestic violence and sexual assault by helping them to find safe housing or putting them in hotels. The Friendship Center has a long history of serving our community and adapting to the needs with which we are faced. When The Friendship Center was founded in 1971, it served as a homeless shelter and safe haven for women experiencing domestic violence. After the Violence Against Women Act passed in 1994, we expanded our mission to serve women who were victims of sexual assault. Since then, we have recognized that violence does not discriminate, and The Friendship Center has grown its mission to serve all victims of these crimes, regardless race, gender or gender identity, age, economic status or disability. Our comprehensive support is also offered to families and household members and those collaterally affected by the victimization.


RMDC Head Start Program

Did you know Townsend has a Head Start program? At Head Start we are more than just a classroom for children. We support the entire family. Parents are their child's first and most important teacher. Rocky Head Start has Family Advocates that partner with each child's family to build a foundation for school readiness, coordinating with education staff and community partners. Head Start Family Advocates meet with every Head Start family. Visits may occur in a family's home, in the child's classroom, or other community settings. During these visits, they work alongside families as they identify strengths and set goals. Families typically set goals relating to housing, health, education, parenting, and financial stability. Family Advocate home visits begin at the start of the school year.

Head Start is a comprehensive early childhood development program that serves low-income children age's three to five and their families.
