This was possibly the best year the market has ever seen. There were 8 to 12 vendors nearly every week. And, on the best days well over 200 people came to experience the market. Many people came for the smoked brisket that Sam and Sheree make. This along with fresh salsa and chips provided for hungry appetites. There were also pies and pie slices, and cookies, cakes and breads. Yum! Yum! And there were plenty of jellies and jams to satisfy that sweet tooth.

A variety of vegetables was available and changed as the season progressed. It started with veggies like asparagus, lettuce, spinach, peas, radishes and the like and moved to veggies like beans, onions, beets and zucchini squash progressing to cucumbers, sweet corn, tomatoes and potatoes with winter squash and pumpkins finishing out the market season. The senior coupon program for purchasing fresh veggies was a success and is growing. Check with Diane Thorne at the County Health Department now for next year.

There were several craft vendors so you could get a wonderful gift for that special person. In fact I, like other vendors, go around and buy items from each other.

You know you have a community family when customers come and help the vendors set up. Speaking of help, we had great volunteers again this year. Several came from Allison's Master Gardener class. Another addition is Jemma's 4H and FFA students that grow plants in the school greenhouse and bring them for sale to help earn money for school projects. It's great to see young people willing to work to earn their way. We even had a young man come, play his guitar and sing.

Weather is always a concern and we had a few times that the market was shortened due to wind and storms. But most times the vendors stuck it out and some tuff customers came to buy.

Well it's been a long season from the end of May to the end of September every Thursday afternoon from 3-6 PM. And we still have one to go. This last Thursday

DU has conserved more than 16 million acres of waterfowl habitat in North America, more than any other conservation organization in existence, including restoring, enhancing, and protecting 501,369 acres within Montana. While DU's #1 priority is waterfowl, more than 900 wildlife species benefit from our conservation work. During Fiscal Year 2022 (FY22), DU protected and restored more than 575,000 acres of wetlands and other wildlife habitats across the United States alone.

Whether you are a long time resident or a new neighbor in our valley, now is a good time to think about how incredibly fortunate we are to have the proximity of a long-term care facility with a connected hospital right here in Townsend. It is truly up to us to keep it open. We never know who or when a family member will need it!

It's easy to think that the presence of the beautiful new building built by Billings Clinic was the answer to the financial woes we suffered in 2012. Indeed, Billings Clinic Broadwater being our partner gives us many advantages, but its financial stability still relies on community utilization and support.

The Circle 100 Club was started in 2012 as an offshoot of The Broadwater Community Health Foundation. In that year our little hospital was hit with a blow to its finances when it lost its Medicare funding. A group of hardy souls took up the cause to save the institution...especially the Long-Term Care Facility. Hence, The Circle 100 Club was formed.

Twelve Montana nursing homes had to close this year due to staffing shortages and the increasing cost of staff, medical equipment, and essential supplies. Billings Clinic Broadwater faces this very same challenge which makes your support so vital.


In these ELEVEN YEARS, the Circle 100 Club has raised nearly \$100,000 to procure equipment and facility upgrades as recommended by the hospital staff. We have helped to purchase a bladder scanner, blood warmers, lab equipment, towel/blanket warmers, overbed tables, room furniture, kitchen equipment, automatic handicap doors, bath lift and much more.

Tri-County COAD

The Tri-County COAD is a humanitarian association of human services and faith-based organizations, government agencies, businesses, and individuals whose purpose is to advocate for and promote a coordinated, county wide disaster preparedness planning initiative that aims to integrate its members into the county comprehensive emergency system.

The mission of the Tri-County Community Organizations Active in Disaster is to coordinate effective, efficient, and streamlined service delivery to people affected by disaster, while eliminating unnecessary duplication of effort, through the four phases of disaster: preparation, response, recovery and mitigation.

The Tri-County COAD is not a competing or exclusionary organization. The Tri-County COAD is intended to be a network for organizations and individuals active in disaster. Each Tri-County COAD member organization will maintain its own identity and independence while closely collaborating with other Tri-County COAD member organizations.

Tri-County COAD accomplishes its mission by adhering to the following principles:

- Cooperation: Foster cooperation among Tri-County COAD member organizations and individuals at all levels and phases of disaster.
- *Coordination:* Coordinate the development of Tri-County COAD policies and procedures, and the implementation of services among Tri-County COAD members. Tri-County COAD may also provide links to national and international disaster relief organizations. Tri-County COAD serves as advocate and liaison between member organizations and the Montana Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD).
- *Communication:* Exchange and disseminate information among Tri-County COAD members and the public, as well as local, state and federal agencies.
- *Collaboration:* Work together to achieve specific goals and to undertake specific projects at disaster sites and form partnerships during the disaster response.
 - Education- providing training and increasing awareness and preparedness in each organization.
 - Leadership Development- giving volunteer leaders training and support in order to build an effective COAD organization.
 - Mitigation- support the mitigation efforts of local, state and federal authorities; participate in local mitigation strategy organizations; participate in efforts to educate residents and representatives about actions they can take to protect individuals, property, the environment and economy from the effects of disaster.
 - <u>Convening Mechanisms</u>- coordinating and supporting seminars, meetings, board meetings, regional conferences, training programs and local conferences.
 - <u>Outreach</u>- encouraging the formation of and giving guidance to state and regional voluntary organizations active in disaster.
- *Financial:* The United Way and the Salvation Army will share financial responsibilities for the Tri-County COAD.

The main member groups of the Tri-County COAD are: Salvation Army, Red Cross, Boy Scouts of America, Lewis and Clark County Public Health, United Way of the Lewis and Clark Area, St. Peter's Health, Child Care Connections, Good Samaritan Ministries, Many Rivers Whole Health, Rocky Mountain Development Council.

Broadwater County Fair Update

We are excited to say that we have completed our Graymont Carbon Reduction Fund Grant project! Last year we applied for the first ever GCRF grant and were chosen as one of the few recipients for it. Because of this grant, we were able to become more energy efficient and environmentally friendly by upgrading our lighting in the Roping Barn, the Commercial Building and the 4-H Building as well as replace the furnace and the two ceiling heating units in the 4-H Building! These new upgrades make the buildings much more user friendly and warm. And we should be seeing some savings on our monthly energy bills and propane usage soon as well.

Thank you so much to Graymont. The grant is awarded through their corporate office, but our local plant was the direct contact for us, and really supported us through every step of the process. Also, thank you to our local contractors- Green Source Electric and Special K Plumbing- for their patience with the whole process, and then getting in there and getting the work done for us. We really appreciate everyone's hard work on this, and hope that these upgrades help our community be able to enjoy what our fairgrounds have to offer.

Planting the Second Generation of Trees By Patrick Plantenberg, Chair Townsend Tree Board

The Tree Board has been actively planting trees in Townsend since 2004 to replace the first generation of trees planted here historically. A couple of people have been able to help plant the first and second generation of trees.

Lisa Gravely helped her mother Elaine, and others plant the large cottonwood trees at the Fairgrounds when she was just a young girl. Now, she has been actively planting trees at the Fairgrounds with the Tree Board since 2007. Usually at least one tree has been planted on Ag Day in the spring of each year.



Martin Mingay helped plant the first generation of trees in McCarthy Park in the 1990s. At least 60 trees were planted. Many have died and the Tree Board has started removing the dead trees and stumps and replanting trees in McCarthy Park in 2023. Martin has been actively helping the Tree Board plant the second generation of trees.

Broadwater County Development Corporation (BCDC)

CARB (Community Advisory and Research Building) Committee

After completing Phase ll of our Community Review, five committees were formed to research the top priorities decided by the people attending the last Community Review meetings in March of 2023. The five committees are Housing, Child Care, Aging Gracefully, Multi-Use Community Center, Trails, and Broadband. Most of the committees started meeting in April and are making progress. These committees are all under the auspices of BCDC as it was the host and lead organization for the Community Review. BCDC is also a 501 c3 nonprofit organization. These committees, and their research, benefit all of Broadwater County and beyond.

The CARB committee has been meeting since April. Various issues, options, and ideas have been discussed. Here are some of the priorities we have discussed.

Issues and Ideas

Location has still not been determined although we have researched a few options. All these locations are within two miles of Townsend.



The Aquatics facility has been a top priority and has been researched the most so far, but it's not the only priority consideration. A competition pool incorporated in with a lap pool, therapy pool, lazy river, and waterpark ideas are being considered. We are also looking at ways to mitigate

the chlorine treatments associated with public pools and all agreed to make this experience as heathy as possible. New healthy water treatments such as

Ozone and UV to replace chlorine are being researched.

Fitness is an integral part of the mix and will be a large part of this facility. A gym for basketball, volleyball, pickleball, exercise spaces for wellness including weights, aerobics, yoga, overhead track, etc. are all being factored in.



Childcare is an ongoing issue in the area and currently we are in what they call a childcare desert. With only about a fifth of the daycare needs met, we are looking at providing a full-service daycare. There would also be a child drop off service for parents while they are using the facility.

A Commercial Kitchen would be used for the childcare space, concessions, lounge, possible culinary training, dinner meetings and banquet type functions.



Meeting and Office spaces will be needed for our growing nonprofit groups as meeting space continues to shrink. We will be thinking of ways to utilize these spaces for multiple uses as our needs grow. Office spaces might offer advantages for various reasons. The lease of these spaces would also contribute towards the overhead costs of the facility. At the Woodbine CREW center, the senior citizens have their coffee klatch there every day. Just a warm, friendly place to gather.

Emergency Shelter and Services are also being considered as there is always the possibility of some sort of catastrophe or need. We will be researching the best technology to provide the most secure type of survival services.

What Type of Structure is best suited and least expensive for our center? Sprung Structures is a company who manufactures a high-tech tensioned fabric placed over aluminum truss spans. This is a very airtight building that has a good insulation package. These structures are well suited



for our climate as they withstand wind and cold. They are used in many different applications and climates such as recreational venues that include water sports, gymnasiums, and hockey arenas. The Woodbine CREW Center in Woodbine, Iowa uses this structure and their people are very happy with it. Other uses include military, manufacturing, shelters, offices, and many others. These buildings go up fast, many times in four months, not including groundwork, thus saving money.

Funding – I know what you're thinking, what's this all going to cost? We are not at that stage yet, but it's guaranteed to be several million dollars. We have just started a funding campaign to get some seed money. BCDC has received over \$36,000 from the now dissolved TRAC organization earmarked for recreation. We are hoping to leverage this money and use it for matching funds for grants. We will be looking for all types of funding to get there.

After construction there will be overhead and maintenance costs which must be addressed. Membership and usage fees will be utilized along with rental from office space, banquets, meetings, childcare, etc. All these possible revenue streams will be researched to alleviate these anticipated expenses.

Support – We need the support of all of you in this process as this project is for you! There is a community center that is going in or has been finished in Poplar. It was started by the kids as they were tired of losing too many family, friends and citizens to poor health. This was a way to keep them around longer! And remember, winter is always coming! Wouldn't it be great to soak in a nice warm pool when it's cold outside or be able to take your walk without having to think you could freeze before you get back home?

We are still looking for a few high schoolers to fill this team. There is a need for all types of skills on this team such as coding, organization, media, fabrication, and assembly. Most of all, they will learn problem solving in all these skills and don't need to be proficient in any of these. You will learn them along the way. STOKE has begun to work with MAPS Media Institute, a Montana professional media instruction organization geared towards helping our youth find their voice. We are discussing the best start for our kids at this point. We will probably put together a one-day clinic to start, with Maps sending an instructor to start the kids producing a video of STOKE's programs. We would also like to develop a photojournalism program with the curriculum TBD if there is enough interest. MAPS Media Institute's clinics are free for any youth organizations.

Recently, STOKE was the recipient of a \$7000 grant from the Town Pump Charitable Organization being chosen along with approximately 100 other organizations around Montana. Actually, Broadwater County did pretty well with the Townsend Tree Board, the Community Theater, and BCDC all receiving the \$7000 anniversary grant.
